Opening Sunday, February 10, 2008 4:00 PM - 7:00 PM



Mayor's Message

I certainly hope that all of our village residents are enjoying the winter! Down here in Bonita Springs, where we have come for a couple of days (mostly business, though) the temperature is 79°!!! But thinking of the snow and ice reminds me that we should all be grateful to our two town's highway departments for the great job they do to keep our roads free of ice and snow

during "weather events." Tony Sharon, Superintendent of Ramapo Highway, and Frank Brooks, Superintendent of Haverstraw Highway, and their skillful teams work long and difficult hours during snow and ice storms, and they certainly deserve our praise and thanks.

One reminder that comes to mind thinking of snow is that you should bring your garbage cans down to the curb after a snow storm. Our garbage contractor will pick up garbage after a storm, but cannot come up your driveways until everything is cleared out. Also, may I remind everyone that neither you nor your snow removal contractor should push snow into the streets. This is strictly against our village code, and I would appreciate everyone making sure that your snow plow contractor is aware of this village law.

We have several events planned for village residents. By the time you read this, our Recreation Committee will have put on a wonderful event for young children – a Snowflake Concert at village hall, featuring Mr. Burr. This interactive participatory concert is an extension of the Moms and Tots program started last year by the Recreation Committee so that people with young children could get to know each other. The cultural center is having an opening reception at the Pomona Cultural Center for the Winter 2008 Art Exhibition. If you have never been to the cultural center, please try to come for a very special evening of music and art, complete with light gourmet fare. You will also get to meet the local artists who are featured in the exhibit. If you cannot make the opening reception, the exhibit will be open for six weeks, Friday, Saturday and Sundays from 2.00 pm to 6.00 pm. The Pomona Cultural Center is a real gem, and our Director/ Curator, Gde Arsa Artha always organizes a wonderful program.

Did you know...?

The Village of Pomona is honored to have within its boundaries a very special gem – Camp Hill Farm – a 2-acre organic/biodynamic farm and learning center. What's new with recycling?

We are now pleased to tell you that you can bring any packaging material like plastic bubble wrap, air sack plastic

and the packaging peanuts to Mail Boxes Etc., 1581 Route 202 (Pacesetter Park). They will be happy to take those items off your hands for re-use. They will also accept cardboard boxes and gently used gift boxes if you no longer want them. It is wonderful to know that these items can be re-used and will not have to clog up the landfill!

Cardboard boxes, however, can also be flattened and put out on the second or fourth Wednesday of the month on paper recycling days. - You may not know that the Village gets a portion of the proceeds back on all items that are recycled in your bins on Wednesdays. On the first and third Wednesday of the month, here in the Village of Pomona, you can recycle just about any kind of paper you can think of in your blue bin – newspaper, catalogs, junk mail, computer, fax and photocopy paper, envelopes and coupons, greeting cards, phone books. On the second and fourth Wednesday, you can recycle co-mingles in your green bins – plastic containers, wax containers from juice and milk, tin foil (including pie plates), refrigerated and frozen food containers. Glass (clear, brown and green)and plastics labeled # 1 - 7.

And generally speaking, there is a way to recycle just about anything you can think of here in Rockland.

While we are on the subject, we also want to remind you about hazardous waste. There are many items that fall under this category and they can be brought to the Rockland County Hazardous Waste Site, off Pomona Road (near the intersection of Route 45). You can bring items there every weekday morning from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. You do not need an appointment, and do not even have to get out of your car when you bring the items over! Here is a partial list—paints, thinners, waxes, resins, driveway sealer, motor oil, pesticides, gasoline antifreeze, thermostats, TVs, VCRs, CD players, telephones, small freon appliances, batteries (household, car, boat, rechargeable and button cell).

It is really important to know about the hazardous waste site because some people think it is okay to pour liquid wastes down the storm drains, which it isn't. Most of the drains around here drain to streams!
